#### Sen. Roberts has virtual meeting with 2020 youth delegates

Every year during the spring, co-op officials spend a few days on Capitol Hill discussing the issues that are important to the Kansas electric cooperatives. Those visits are then followed by summer visits, when co-ops send area students to Washington, D.C., to gain a close up perspective of our federal government in action. Sen. Roberts has been an avid supporter of co-ops during his tenure and has always prioritized meeting with co-op delegates at both events. Due to COVID-19, the 2020 Legislative Conference and the Youth Tour were cancelled, so this year's visit with Senator Roberts occurred virtually. More than 30 students and co-op staff, repre-

senting 18 member-cooperatives, attended.

Sen. Roberts commented that he's always been impressed with past youth tour delegates. "The attitude and leadership of this youth group is so special," Roberts told the group.

Addressing the students, the Senator encouraged them to consider that the U.S. Capitol belongs to them. "Think of this as your Capitol," he said. "No matter all of the problems that we may have here, we are depending on you. You are the future. Re-dedicate yourself to your country, and help us restore what you think is right with our nation."

Sen. Roberts then answered questions from the students. Topics included finding a vaccine for COVID-19, the Black Lives Matter movement, and privatized space exploration.

The web conference also gave KEC staff a chance to thank the Senator, who upon his announced retirement will not be returning as a U.S. Senator in January.

"You have truly inspired a generation of future leaders in Kansas and beyond," said KEC CEO **LEE TAFANELLI**. "We thank you for both your years of service in public office and your support of the electric cooperatives' youth programs."

#### Rep. Steven Johnson meets with youth leadership council applicants

Prior to NRECA canceling the Youth Leadership Council (YLC) events for this year, KEC staff developed a creative approach to select the Kansas representative to the YLC. Traditionally, applicants would be interviewed on the first day of youth tour, the chaperones would select the finalists, and the students would elect their representative to the national council.

"Since we didn't have the opportunity to meet our applicants this year, we developed a new process to get to know the students better," said Shana Read, KEC's director of education and training.

The applicants were asked to participate in a series of activities that included writing an essay, having a personal online interview, and taking part in a virtual conference with **REP. STEVEN JOHNSON**.

During the conference, Johnson shared how his

involvement in the Youth Tour program in 1983 helped inspire him to get involved in politics. He also spoke about the electric cooperatives.

"When I was your age, I didn't know much about electric cooperatives. But as I got involved in the program, I learned the concept of one member, one vote and the ability to dream big," Johnson said. "If we could use the cooperative model and apply it to the legislative model, we could accomplish big things."

"Dream big dreams," he encouraged the students. "I look forward to the ideas that you will achieve."

Each of the students was invited to ask a question concerning something they were passionate about. Topics ranged from the oil industry, prison reform, college financial aid, the COVID-19 pandemic, affordable health care, and financial assistance for small businesses.





## Kansas Co-ops Vote events kick off

This fall, Kansans will have the opportunity to vote for candidates who will represent them in D.C., Topeka, and at local levels of government. Kansas' electric cooperatives are using the election season as a chance to get to know candidates and educate those interested in holding elected office on issues of importance to electric cooperatives and the communities that they serve.

The visits are a part of the Co-ops Vote initiative, a non-partisan effort to encourage electric co-op members to be educated, engaged voters.

This year's visits are designed as informal come-and-go events to allow for ultimate flexibility and provide for adequate social distancing needs. As part of this effort KEC staff and candidates for elected office have spent time visiting electric cooperatives to talk with staff about COVID-19 response efforts at the cooperatives and in the communities, the importance of broadband infrastructure, and the vitality of rural Kansas.

KEC staff has held visits at 4 Rivers, Sedgwick County, Sumner-Cowley, and Flint Hills over the course of the last two weeks. Additional visits will be held throughout both the primary and general election cycles.

#### Alfalfa Electric Co-op completes new headquarters

To more efficiently serve its more than 4,000 memberowners, Alfalfa has relocated to new head-quarters in Cherokee, OK.

Construction of the 16,000 sq.

ft. building began at the end of 2018, and despite delays due to weather and COVID-19, the project was completed in early June.

"Our new headquarters facility will better serve our members and employees with the latest technology, ease of access, and safety features for many generations to come," said **GREG GOETZ**, Alfalfa's general manager/CEO. "I am proud of our board of trustees and employees for the group effort to complete a project like this."



The new facility has a modern dispatch center with a live wall map of its system that allows realtime outage management and vehicle tracking for

improved response time and increased safety for crews. A drive-through window helps to serve the members.

A 10,000 sq. ft. vehicle storage building houses the trucks and equipment used by its crews.

The new headquarters was built using insulated concrete form construction which makes it energy efficient. The building includes a hardened area to protect sensitive data and employees. In addition, there are two electric vehicle (EV) charging stations.

#### **Butler employees show commitment to community**

During this time of precaution, most co-op staff meetings include disinfectant and face masks. But for the employees at Butler Electric, the meeting on June 25 included white hair nets and bright yellow funnels.

Showing their commitment to community, nearly 40 employees worked together to assemble more than 6,000 meals to donate to the local Kids Need 2 Eat program. This summer program assists communities in overcoming barriers to all children having daily access to nutritious food.

"Our Operation Round Up committee looked for a hands-on project so the employees could feel for the difference they're making instead of just writing a check," explained Sarah Madden, Butler's office manager.

Each meal consisted of shelf-stable packets of macaroni and cheese that were enhanced with nutrients. The supplies were provided by the Iowa-based Outreach Program

and funded through a combination of the cooperative's Operation Round Up and Co-Bank's Sharing Success matching grant program.

There were dozens of tables set up in the co-op meeting room to accommodate the meal prep stations, and an 80's music playlist set the tone. Butler's line crews and office staff worked together in teams to combine the ingredients, and seal the bags. Another group boxed up the packets, and stacked the finished and taped-up boxes. The boxes were then distributed to local school-aged children throughout Butler county.

In addition to the donation of the supplies to the Outreach Program, Butler's Operation Round Up committee also donated \$1,000 to the Kids Need 2 Eat program.

#### Bluestem Electric Cooperative's new meeting space receives acoustic upgrade

Despite months of COVID-19 related delays, Bluestem Electric Cooperative successfully installed artistic panels to improve the sound quality of the co-op's meeting space.

On April 23, 2019, Bluestem employees moved into their new facility in Wamego. MARLA MARSHALL, Bluestem's office manager, said that staff started to think about artwork for the new building shortly after the move.

"We wanted similar artwork that we had at the Clay Center office after the building remodel in 2013," Marshall stated. "When we were going through the same process for the Wamego office, we realized we had this huge wall in the meeting room. From the time that we spent in that space, it was obvious the acoustics were bad and there was a terrible echo. We hoped to incorporate something to help, as well as get some cool artwork up on the wall."

Bluestem employees began brainstorming and Marshall started sketching out ideas for the artwork. Michael Morton, Bluestem's general manager, mentioned incorporating the cooperative principles.

In the fall of 2019, Marshall reached out to Carrie Kimberlin, KEC's manager of creative solutions. Kimberlin created the final layout of the wall design and managed the installation logistics. Fast-Signs in Topeka produced and installed

the panels.

The completed artwork was ready to be installed in the meeting room earlier this year. However, the pandemic put the project on hold until June 16. Bluestem staff have been pleased with the result.

"The panels have helped enormously with the acoustic problem," Marshall stated. "I'm very happy that we learned that KEC offered this service in time to take on this project."

## Smith named as Kansas representative to YLC

ANALUZ SMITH, sponsored by Alfalfa Electric, was chosen to represent Kansas on the NRECA Youth Leadership Council. Due to safety concerns regarding COVID-19, the YLC conference and the youths' participation in the 2021 NRECA Annual Meeting have been cancelled, but Smith will be able to retain the honor of having been selected.

The cancellation of the YLC events for this summer and next spring came after the 2020 Electric Cooperative Youth Tour to Washington, D.C., was cancelled.

Selection of the YLC is typically done by the students while on the trip. Instead, this year, the YLC applicants were asked to complete a series of projects including writing an essay about how the pandemic has affected them, to have a virtual personal interview with staff, and to participate in a video conference with an elected official.

Smith, who will be a senior at Medicine Lodge High School this fall, plans to study

nursing. She is actively involved in National Honors Society, FFA, Science Club, Forensics, pep band, and also plays basketball, volleyball, and is on the track team. When she's not busy with work, academics, or extracurricular activities, she volunteers at her church and in her community.

Even though all of the YLC activities were canceled, Smith was still thankful for having been chosen to present Kansas.

"When asked about the trip, I tell people that I may not get to experience what all the trip

had to offer, but I did get to experience the process that no other delegates from the years before got to," Smith said. "I'm thankful for getting to be involved in a new process created in spite of COVID-19."

Last month, Alfalfa staff invited Smith and the other youth program winners to their new headquarter facilities where they presented each of the students with USB pens and a MacBook.
