> "Coming into the position, I simply hoped to produce a



magazine each month," Larry recalled of his first day on the job. "As time went on, I realized the power and potential the magazine had as not only a communication tool but a method to help highlight rural businesses, events and agritourism for the benefit of our members."

The consummate diplomat, Larry hesitates to choose a favorite issue or article he's produced during his tenure at KEC, but he's quick to describe one of his most memorable experiences, which happened during a photo shoot at the Hollenberg Pony Express Station in Hanover. While snapping photos of the building to accompany an article, Larry encountered a less-thanfriendly visitor.

"I went up the stairs to take photos and there was a rattlesnake waiting for me." Larry says despite the unfriendly encounter, he finished the photo shoot-albeit outside. "You learn to persevere whatever the situation gives you."

From typewriters to computers and from

black-and-white film developing in a darkroom to digital photography, technology used to produce Kansas Country Living continuously evolves. Larry says the upshot to the many changes in three decades has been their positive affect on him personally.

"Change is constant and you must adjust no matter what," Larry stated. "Changes at work have helped me adjust to changes in life."

After his last official day on May 22, Larry may not miss the monthly deadlines or having to arise by 5:30 a.m. each weekday morning, but he said he will miss the shared camaraderie among electric co-op employees that he describes as "unique."

"I'm thankful for the friendships I've made over the years with co-op employees around the state," Larry explains. "I'll miss the friendly and genuine readers I've come in contact with over the years. They've come to appreciate the magazine and all it brings to their mailboxes each month.

"I've learned the degree of care and quality that electric cooperatives have for the members and their communities, and I'm grateful to have been given the opportunity to highlight the rural Kansas resolve, resourcefulness and spirit through the printed page. It's been a genuine honor and pleasure to serve our state's electric cooperatives," he shared.

Larry was honored by the KEC Board of Trustees on May 14, and by the Kansas Member Services Directors Association (KMSDA) on April 9.

Senator Moran boosts co-ops at NRECA Legislative Conference

On May 4-5, 31 employees and directors from electric cooperatives in Kansas met with the state's Congressional Delegation and their staff while in Washington, D.C., for NRECA's Legislative Conference.

The two-day summit gave 1,650 co-op officials the latest information on issues critical to maintaining affordable and reliable electric service to 42 million co-op members nationwide. This year's program featured education sessions that explained key issues to strengthen communication related

to regulatory challenges and legislative solutions such as the Ratepayer Protection Act, Waters of the United States, the Endangered Species Act, and more.

"The visits have been followed by action in Congress that begins to address a couple key regulatory relief requests," said Bruce Graham, KEC Chief Executive Officer. "The House has advanced legislation that delays enforcement of the Lesser Prairie Chicken listing under the Endangered Species Act. We appreciate the support of all four members of the Kansas House delegation on this initiative."

That good news was matched by introduction in the Senate of the Affordable Reliable Energy Now Act (ARENA). Prior to the Legislative Conference, such a bill did not exist. Sen. Pat Roberts was immediately interested in helping to get this crafted and is an original co-sponsor of the proposal. There is a corresponding bill in the House that was previously introduced.

In addition, Sen. Jerry Moran was a featured speaker at the NRECA Legislative Conference. During his speech, Moran reviewed several of the

major issues, mentioned the importance of Youth Tour, and impressed the importance of the co-op visits to the legislative process.

"Despite the challenges posed by an ever-growing number of burdensome federal regulations, the NRECA works to support the interests of electric cooperatives and the consumers they serve," said Moran.
